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Dear Colleagues,

Welcome to Boston, Massachusetts, for the American Political Science Association's 114th Annual Meeting and Exhibition!

The 2018 theme is **Democracy and its Discontents**. Contemporary democracies face multiple challenges: voters are increasingly polarized in many countries, international alliances are creaking under new strains, global investment and immigration flows challenge existing identities and loyalties, and a new information environment has led to both uncertainty about truth and facts, plausibly increasing partisanship and distrust. We need to understand the nature and origins of these challenges—both as scholars and as citizens.

Several theme panels that focus on democracy and its discontents can be found on page 21. We also have three breaking news panels, which include "Facebook and Democracy" on Thursday at 12:00 p.m., "The Humanitarian Crisis of Family Separation and Migrant Detention under Trump's Zero Tolerance Policy" on Thursday at 4 p.m., and "International Alliances in the Age of Anxiety" on Friday at 4:00 p.m. Additionally, Danielle Allen from Harvard University will be speaking in the plenary session, "In Defense of a Democratic Republic: Scholar-Citizens from Federalist to the Present," on Saturday at 4:00 p.m. All of these events will take place in Hynes 302.

We also encourage you to attend the Presidential Address by APSA President Kathleen Thelen at 6:15 p.m. on Thursday in Hynes 302. The Opening Reception will immediately follow at 7:30 p.m. in Hynes 304.

The Annual Meeting this year is hosting two exciting events: The Diversity and Inclusion Hackathon and the Teaching and Learning Conference at APSA. The Diversity and Inclusion Hackathon will take place on Friday at 12:00 p.m. in Hynes 311, with a reception to follow at 5:00 p.m. The goal is to build on past and present efforts by APSA and its component organizations to promote diversity and inclusion by creating a collaborative, diverse, and inclusive space for annual meeting participants to come together. At the Hackathon, teams will develop strategies that address key challenges facing the profession, build partnerships, and plans to move forward.

The inaugural Teaching and Learning Conference (TLC) at the annual meeting will take place on Saturday in Hynes 309 – 313 from 8:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., with a reception to follow at 7:00 p.m. in Hynes 312. The full day event will focus on the theme "Political Science Education in Contentious Times." TLC at APSA seeks to promote the scholarship of teaching and learning, equip faculty with new techniques and resources for teaching, and enhance the role of teaching in the discipline of political science. ANTI-HARASSMENT POLICY

APSA has received notice from several sources that graduate students and faculty have experienced sexual harassment at various conference venues. APSA consequently reminds everyone:

The APSA Annual Meeting and related regional political science meetings are convened for the purposes of professional development and scholarly and educational interchange in the spirit of free inquiry and free expression. Harassment of colleagues, students, or other conference participants undermines the principle of equity at the heart of these professional fora and is inconsistent with the principles of free inquiry and free expression. Consequently, harassment is considered by APSA to be a serious form of professional misconduct.

The following Anti-Harassment Policy outlines expectations for all those who attend or participate in APSA meetings. It reminds APSA meeting participants that all professional academic ethics and norms apply as standards of behavior and interaction at these meetings.

1. Purpose

APSA is committed to providing a safe and welcoming conference environment for all participants, regardless of actual or perceived gender, gender identity, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, ability, socioeconomic status, age, or religion.

"Participant" in this policy refers to anyone present at APSA meetings, including staff, contractors, vendors, exhibitors, venue staff, APSA members, and all other attendees.

2. Expected Behavior

All participants at APSA meetings are expected to abide by this Anti-Harassment Policy in all meeting venues including ancillary events and official and unofficial social gatherings.

- Abide by the norms of professional respect that are necessary to promote the conditions for free academic interchange.
- If you witness potential harm to a conference participant, be proactive in helping to mitigate or avoid that harm.
- Alert conference or security personnel if you see a situation in which someone might be in imminent physical danger.

3. Unacceptable Behavior

Unacceptable behaviors include:

- persistent and unwelcome solicitation of emotional or physical intimacy
- persistent and unwelcome solicitation of emotional or physical intimacy accompanied by real or implied threat of professional harm
- intimidating, harassing, abusive, derogatory or demeaning speech or actions by any participant in an APSA meeting and/or at any related event
- prejudicial actions or comments related to actual or perceived gender, gender identity, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, ability, socioeconomic status, age, or religion that coerce others, foment broad hostility, or otherwise undermine professional equity or the principles of free academic exchange
- deliberate intimidation, stalking or following
- harassing photography or recording
- sustained disruption of talks or other events
- physical assault (including unwelcome touch or groping)
- real or implied threat of physical harm

The APSA Ombuds is available for consultation with any annual meeting attendees who believes that they have experienced any form of harassment, or have concerns about violations of the sexual harassment provisions of the APSA anti-harassment policy while onsite at the 2018 annual meeting. 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
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
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



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
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
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
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


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
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
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


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
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
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
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









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
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
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
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
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










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
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
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
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
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
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




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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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


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
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
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
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
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
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



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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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


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
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Populism is a peer-reviewed, international journal devoted to promoting transdisciplinary examination of populism in both historical and contemporary contexts. The journal's fundamental premise is that, while there is currently no coherent frame of analysis, most experts do agree that populism is a complex and variegated phenomenon that should be examined from different theoretical perspectives and methodological approaches. Moreover, there is general agreement about its growing importance in the social sciences and about the rather obvious etymological fact that it is predicated upon the positing of an antagonistic relationship between two collective entities: 'the people' and 'the elites'.

However, here is where scholarly consensus ends and disagreement comes to the fore. Some researchers prefer to approach populism as an ideology; others consider it as a mode of expression, a discursive style, a species of rhetoric, a political style, a type of political logic, or an exclusionary form of identity politics. Still others eschew such ideational and discursive approaches in favor of more policycentered and organizational perspectives on populism as a political strategy, a strategy of political organization, or a political project of mobilization that also includes social movements. Put in an even more general framework, populism has also been referred to as a dimension of political culture. Although these different approaches are not necessarily mutually exclusive, they can be usefully associated with three distinct research paradigms identified by Gidron and Bonikowski (2013): (1) populism as political ideology; (2) populism as political style; and (3) populism as political strategy.

Populist currents have characterized many of the most pivotal events and developments in human history—often in times when established institutions lose their normative influence over individual and collective behavior. Aiming to serve as the premier forum for transdisciplinary research, the journal seeks to foster reflection on populism as one powerful way in which societies respond to rapid change in the social order. With that in mind, we also encourage contributions that discuss the impact of globalization on the transformation of the conventional ideological landscape in general and on populism in particular.

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
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
